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

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
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Checking on Station

also privileged to have VADM Whitesell, our ninth Air Boss, on board for the entire Symposium. He shared his vision for Naval Aviation and praised our community for its many accomplishments, in operations and from a man, train, and equip perspective.



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
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In the News

MPA Hosts 10th Symposium

The annual Maritime Patrol Association (MPA) Symposium has finally returned to Jacksonville after a two-year break. The tradition was celebrated from May 11-13 and drew many distinguished guests. All were present to take part in lectures, discussions, and social gatherings focused on the latest developments inside the Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Force (MPRF).

With an attendance list of more than 900 people for the week, this year's symposium brought a crowd that made history.

It all began with a special welcome from VADM Kenneth Whitesell, Commander Naval Air Forces. The Air Boss helped kick off the 2022 Symposium inside the VP-30 auditorium (standing room only). VADM Whitesell started the morning with an NAE Update.

Other notable events included an MPRF community update, an RAF and RAAF community update given by our foreign partners. They were on hand to talk about how the VPI and MPRF communities are growing together.

Planes were on standby for tours all the while the tech expo was the place to meet some of the MPA corporate sponsors and have lunch.

After lunch folks returned to the VP30 Auditorium for the announcement of the winners of the Antisubmarine Warfare (ASW) Fleet Challenge. The Fleet Challenge is a competition between crews from different VP squadrons designed to test tactical knowledge and prowess. The winning crew this year came from VP-45.

The pinnacle event of the first day, and the whole week, was the MPA Heritage Dinner. The dinner was held in historic Hangar 117 and included more than 350 guests. The guest speaker for the evening was Vice Admiral Kenneth Whitesell, Commander, Naval Air Forces (CNAF).

The Fund, in partnership with the Wings Over America Scholarship Foundation, offers financial aid to dependents of active duty military members. Since its inception, the foundation has awarded \$775,000 to Navy families. This year's winning golf team was Erik Estenson, TJ Grady, Ben Hayes and Tyler Terronez.

Friday evening members gathered for one last meeting at the flight suit social. Generations of aviators shared stories and made new friends as the festivities brought the week to a close.

VP-45 Cold Weather Operations

Patrol Squadron Four Five traveled to Bangor, Maine in early February to carry out cold weather operations in preparation for future operations. Daytime temperatures reaching 15 degrees Fahrenheit presented a unique set of challenges not normally experienced in VP-45's home in Jacksonville. NAVAL AIR STATION WHIDBEY ISLAND, WA – Congratulations to Commander Megan M. Donnelly, the newest Commanding Officer of the Screaming Eagles of Patrol Squadron ONE.

Following a return from deployment to NAS Whidbey Island, VP-1 hosted a change of command ceremony where Commander Donnelly relieved Commander Timothy B. Jones as CO. CDR Jones served as Executive Officer of VP-1 from 2020 to 2021 and subsequently as Commanding Officer from 2021 to 2022. Under his leadership, VP-1 executed a challenging multi-site deployment to the US Fourth and Sixth Fleet Areas of Operation. In 2005, he transferred to the aviation community as a Naval Flight Officer operating the P-3C Orion.

Since then, CDR Jones completed multiple deployments as a VP NFO rising to Weapons and Tactics Instructor, department head, and eventually operational command of VP-1. Ashore, he worked as an FRS instructor at VP-30, a department head at the Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Weapons School (MPRWS), and as a cyberspace ops action officer in the J-39 directorate of the Joint Staff.

CDR Jones has a wife, Darcy, and two children. Bravo Zulu and best wishes to you and your family from the MPRA community, CDR Jones!

His successor, CDR Donnelly, boasts an equally distinguished career as an instructor pilot of both the P-3C Orion and the P-8A Poseidon. CDR Donnelly graduated from the US Naval Academy in 2002. Operationally, CDR Donnelly completed multiple deployments as an instructor pilot in VP-26, Assistant Strike Operations Officer of the USS Abraham Lincoln, department head in VP-40, and Executive Officer of VP-1.

VP-10's Red Lancers Conduct Change of Command

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Cmdr. Marc Hines relieved Cmdr. John Houston, becoming the 86th commanding officer of the "Red Lancers" of Patrol Squadron (VP) 10, during a change of command ceremony at Naval Air Station (NAS) Jacksonville on May 6th.

VP-10, which operates the P-8A Poseidon aircraft, is one of the original naval aviation squadrons and one of the oldest patrol squadrons in the Navy. It traces its official heritage to 1930 with the commissioning of Patrol Bombing Squadron 10S, and operated as an instrumental asset during the Battle of Midway.

This ceremony marked the conclusion of a successful tour for Cmdr. Houston. Over the course of his career, he accumulated over 2,600 flight hours in the P-3C Orion and P-8A Poseidon aircraft. While under Houston's command, VP-10 won the 2020 Battle "E", the 2021 Safety "S" Award, and the VP Golden Wrench Award for Maintenance Excellence.

Cmdr. Houston recently led the squadron through deployment to the Fourth and Seventh Fleet Areas of Responsibility. During his time as commanding officer, he inspired VP-10 to reach high levels of operational excellence while conducting antisubmarine warfare; anti-surface warfare; and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance missions in support of Combatant Commander's Fleet objectives.

Cmdr. Hines joined VP-10 as the executive officer in May 2021. His other operational tours include VP-40, the USS George H.W. Bush (CVN-77) and VP-1 as an Instructor Tactical Coordinator (TACCO), Weapons and Tactics Instructor (WTI) and Assistant Navigator (ANAV). Cmdr. Hines' shore tours consisted of VP-30, Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Weapons School (MPRWS), Patrol and Reconnaissance Group/Pacific and Navy Personnel Command (PERS-43). His personal awards include four Strike/Flight Air Medals, four Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals, four Navy and Marine Corp Achievement Medals, and various campaign, unit, and service awards. He takes command of VP-10 as they prepare to deploy and execute missions in support of Seventh Fleet commander's objectives throughout the Indo-Pacific Region.

Rear Adm. Brad Rosen, Chief of Staff, Navy Installations Command, provided remarks as the guest speaker for the change of command ceremony. He offered his thanks to Houston for a successful tour, and thanked VP-10 for their continued success in operations both at home and abroad.

Capt. Daniel Boman, Commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing 11, presided over the ceremony and awarded Houston the Meritorious Service Medal on behalf of Commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Group.

VP-10 also welcomes Cmdr. Luke Huston as the squadron's new executive officer.

The VP-10 "Red Lancers" are based in Jacksonville, Florida. The squadron is preparing to conduct maritime patrol and reconnaissance as well as theatre outreach operations within U.S. Seventh Fleet area of operations.




