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
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
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Checking on Station

Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Warriors Past and Present.

As we leave 2022 in our wake, I would like to open this edition of Checking on Station by pausing to remember two Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Force (MPRF) Titans whom we have recently lost - RADM (Ret) Frank Gallo and Mr. D. Michael Sheehy. While they will be sorely missed by family and shipmates alike, their legacy lives on in the spirit and professionalism that beats in the heart of every VP, VQ, VPU, and VUP Sailor and Aircrewmen. Very few have had as a profound and lasting impact on Maritime Patrol Aviation than Admiral Gallo and Mike Sheehy. We truly stand on the shoulders of Giants.

I am pleased to report that as we start 2023 your MPRF is stronger than ever. We achieved many significant milestones over the last year, and I could not be more grateful for the service and sacrifice of the men and women of the MPRF and the families that support them. It is recognized by leadership throughout the Navy that our community is at the forefront of tense head-to-head standoffs with China and Russia. The rise in our operational tempo over the last few years continues unabated and has stressed Force generation of combat ready crews



and pressurized the Fleet introduction of new capabilities. The U.S. prevailed during the cold-war with 24 active component VP squadrons and then took a "peace dividend" in the early 1990's that promptly cut the force in half. Theater Anti-Submarine Warfare (ASW) today is rapidly approaching cold-war levels with Russia and China fielding more capable and dangerous submarines. Not surprisingly the P-8 Poseidon has earned the well-deserved reputation as the preeminent ASW platform in ours or any Navy.

With Russia's unprovoked invasion of Ukraine last February, the world order was challenged to an extent not seen since WWII. A war on the European continent is not something we expected to experience in our lifetime, and make no mistake...China is watching this conflict very closely. While there may not be indications of imminent conflict between super powers, our aircrews – both deployed and at-home - are flying around the clock to detect, track, and deter potential adversaries and ensure the peace. Armed with the latest technology and state-of-the art weapon systems, it is through robust training and professional execution in the air and on the ground that our talented men and women avoid miscalculations and stay safe. We are winning.

As we venture into the New Year, we do so with a healthy stable of P-8A Poseidons. This month will see Boeing deliver the 117th of 138 required P-8As to the Fleet. In a series of "firsts," the Reserves began P-8A Transition at NAS Jacksonville, and VUP-19 received its first MQ-4C Triton Multi-INT aircraft at NS Mayport, FL. Moreover, VUP-19 will accept additional Multi-INT jets starting this month and is well on its way to its inaugural deployment later this year. The on-time deployment of Triton Multi-INT is a critical piece of our transition plan to disestablish VQ-1 and retire the EP-3 Aries II. Not to be outdone, allied interest in P-8A continues to grow with New Zealand receiving its first of 4 P-8As, and Canada expressing its intention to recapitalize its CP-140 Aurora squadrons with Poseidon. This is very good news as it serves to increases the size of the MPRA force worldwide and provides opportunity for increased interoperability. Your MPRF is well positioned for the challenges that lie ahead. I remain supremely confident in the men

and women of this community to meet these challenges and provide the maneuver space our nation needs to win. With a bias for action, I have armed our COs with Commander's Intent that when coupled with professional execution and Mission Command will provide a recipe for victory under any circumstance.

I start this year with gratitude for the men and women that go forward each and every day wrapped in the cloth of our nation supported by family, neighbors, and those that have gone before them. I am grateful for this community and those who built it - aviators like RADM Gallo and Mike Sheehy - and the distinguished membership of the Maritime Patrol Association. I look forward to seeing many of you in Jacksonville this April for our annual MPRF Symposium.

Until then, I wish you all the best as we continue to Fly, Fight, Lead and Win!

Rear Admiral Anthony Maness Tactical Operations Center

Although P-3C Orion aircraft are no longer stationed in Hawaii, their more than 80-year legacy lives on in the last permanent Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Force (MPRF) asset located on the island of Oahu: the Tactical Operations Center (TOC) at Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay (K-Bay).

First based at Barber's Point, Commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing TWO (CPRW-2) transitioned to K-Bay in 1999, where the TOC was constructed on the flight-line across the street from historic Hangar 104 to provide support for Patrol Squadron (PATRON) FOUR. NINE, and FOUR SEVEN.

For 20 years, P-3 crews trained and deployed out of K-Bay, supported by the TOC which supplied tactical coordination, communications, mission planning, and training, and generations of Aviation Warfare Operators conducted advanced acoustic training under the watchful eye of "Beartrap Pat". The last P-3C squadron departed Hawaii in 2017 and transitioned to the P-8A Poseidon platform in Whidbey Island, WA, and CPRW-2 disestablished in 2018.

TOC K-Bay has the honor of bearing the name of Rear Admiral Anthony Maness, inducted into the Maritime Patrol Association Hall of Honor in 2022. He served in Hawaii as Commanding Officer of PATRON SIX, Wing Operations Officer for CPRW-2, and Commander, Patrol Wings U.S. Pacific Fleet (PACFLEET). In light of his historic career, a 2001 citation from Commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Force (CPRF) U.S PACFLEET officially named the TOC (then the Tactical Support Facility) on Marine Corps Base Hawaii K-Bay as the Rear Admiral Anthony Maness Tactical Support Facility.

Rear Admiral Maness was a strong voice in the Post-Cold War era for continued MPRF deployments and proficiency in open-ocean and littoral Antisubmarine Warfare (ASW), as well as oceanic and coastal Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance. He was also the "driving force behind the concept, planning, and establishment of Tactical Support Centers throughout the world" (CPRF Pacific Citation).

Thanks to Rear Admiral Maness' efforts, current MPRF squadrons have dedicated Command, Control, Communications, Computers, Cyber, Intelligence and mission planning support facilities at home and while deployed.

TOC K-Bay is now incorporated under Tactical Operations Control Squadron TEN (TOCRON-10) which was established at Naval Air Station (NAS) Whidbey Island in June 2020. TOCRON-10's mission is to provide MPRF commanders with a tactical, fully integrated, physical infrastructure suite to execute the planning, direction, and control of MPRF aircraft operations throughout the full spectrum of warfare.

Squadron support is provided through two permanent TOCs (TOC NAS Whidbey Island and TOC K-Bay), six TacMobile expeditionary detachments, and a Carrier Tactical Support Center Detachment.

P-8As operating out of K-Bay stand a PACFLEET Homeland Defense (HLD) ready and support Navy Joint training and operations. In addition to traditional ASW and ASUW for Navy commanders, the HLD crews provide Maritime Domain Awareness and support Link 16 exercises and training with the USAF, USN, and USMC. U.S. Coast Guard District

14 relies on the P-8A to supplement its fixed-wing SAR efforts throughout the western Pacific.

In the past year HLD crews found three vessels, saving four individuals. For their efforts, Sailors from the HLD and TOC received the Coast Guard Meritorious Team Commendation.

For the first time, CTF 172 fully headquartered at the TOC during RIMPAC 2022 multinational exercise. TOCRON-10 supported CTF 172 staff and squadrons from partner nations, including Australia, Canada, India, Japan, Republic

of Korea, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom, who flew P-8A, P-3C, CP-140, P-8I, P-1, and P-3CK out of TOC K-Bay and Hickam Air Base, HI.

TOC K-Bay continues to serve as a keystone in operational readiness for all services in the Pacific Theater. The men and women stationed at K-Bay hold up the traditions and expectations of Rear Admiral Maness in providing high-quality support to the aircraft and aircrew of the world's finest MPRF Fleet.

In The News

VP-30 P-3C 162318 Arrives at New Home, Moffett Field, CA

On Tuesday, September 27th, 2022, U. S. Navy P-3C Orion 162318 arrived at the former Naval Air Station, Moffett Field, California, instead of the desert. After over a year of work to meet all of the requirements for adoption by the National Naval Aviation Museum in Pensacola, Florida, the big day arrived. 318, as she is numbered on the nose, had an impressive record, some of which was painted on the port side nose-wheel door. She was accepted on 6 February 1986 and retired on 30 September 2022 with more than 36 years of service to our country and our Navy.

She accumulated 19,984 flight hours and 14,875 landings. Researching her record, she served at Moffett Field in the former P-3 training squadron, VP-31 in the late 80s and then the Reserve P-3 squadron, VP-91 in the 90s. Later she served in former Moffett Field squadrons VP-9, VP-40, and VP-46 at NAS Whidbey Island, Washington.

The Moffett Field Historical Society and Museum will be the only location in the world with both the analog version and the digital version of the P-3 Orion to show the public the advances in technology. They routinely give tours of the P-3A near base operations and visitors are amazed at what crews could accomplish without computers. Navigators had to use celestial observations to determine their location on the earth. No GPS back in the day. Pictured behind 318 is their P-2 Neptune, providing the Moffett Museum three aircraft that span 80 years of U. S. Navy ASW and long-range patrol history.

The Moffett Field Historical Society hosted a party to celebrate Fleet Week, the Navy's birthday, and the adoption of the P-3C. Many P-3 veterans attended, shared stories of their times in the venerable P-3 Orion and after dinner the dessert was a cake with a picture of 162318.

The Moffett Field Historical Society and Museum expresses their sincere appreciation and gratitude to the Pro's Nest of VP-30. They pledge to take excellent care of the historically significant aircraft that VP-30 has entrusted to their care. It represents the dedicated service of thousands of men and women who flew and supported Patrol aviation worldwide, both in peace and war.



VP-10 Recognized with CNO Aviation Safety Award

CLARK AIR BASE, Philippines - The "Red Lancers" of Patrol Squadron (VP) 10 participated in the multilateral exercise Sama Sama-Lumbas at Clark Air Base, Oct. 11-18. The exercise included forces from Australia, France, Japan, Philippines, United Kingdom, and United States.

Sama Sama, meaning "togetherness" in Malay, is an exercise designed to promote regional security cooperation, maintain and strengthen maritime partnerships, and enhance maritime interoperability. It is an annual partnership between the Philippine Navy and the U.S. Navy, while Lumbas is a yearly exercise between the Philippine Navy and the Royal Australian Navy.

This year the exercises were combined for the first time and helped to strengthen longstanding alliances of the participating forces.

"It was really exciting and challenging working with multiple countries in a singular effort to find the 'survivor,' and incredibly rewarding once we did so," said Naval Aircrewman (Operator) 2nd Class Garrett Carlston, after successfully concluding a search-and-rescue exercise.

Combat Aircrew-3 of the "Red Lancers" also participated in a subject matter expert (SME) exchange with members of the Philippine Navy at Clark Air Base on Luzon Island, Philippines. During the SME exchange the aircrew gave tours of a P-8A Poseidon and explained how the aircraft executes both anti-submarine warfare and intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance missions.

During the exercise, the U.S. and Philippines emphasized togetherness by bringing members of the Armed Forces of the Philippines on board a VP-10 aircraft during a mission exercise flight.

"It was great having the Filipino riders onboard demonstrating the aircrafts capabilities and how we can all work together towards a common goal," said Lt. Cmdr. Douglas Tengler II, the officer in charge of the squadron's Philippines detachment.

VP-46 Returns from 5th and 6th Fleet Deployment

OAK HARBOR, Wash. -- The 'Grey Knights' of Patrol Squadron (VP) 46 returned to their homeport of Naval Air Station Whidbey Island after a six month deployment to the US Fifth and Sixth Fleet Area of Operations, Oct. 1st, 2022.

"I could not be more proud of what the Grey Knights accomplished during this deployment," said Cmdr. Frank Verducci, the commanding officer of VP-46. "It took leadership at all levels to keep the team rowing together even though we were on three different continents! I would also like to give a special thanks to all of the exceptional families at home supporting, which made it possible for their Sailor to bring their 'A' game when we needed them most."

This was the squadron's second deployment since transitioning to the P-8A Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft. VP-46 covered over 4,000 miles of ocean supporting operations for Commander, Task Force (CTF) 57 and 67. The Grey Knight aircrews executed over 600 Sorties totaling over 3,600 Flight Hours and supported exercises such as BALTOPS 22, Joint Warrior, and Northern Viking to name a few.

Over the six months, the Grey Knight maintenance team completed 15 Scheduled Maintenance Inspections, qualified five personnel as 'Safe for Flight', 21 Plane Captains, 20 Collateral Duty Inspectors, and 2 Quality Assurance Reps. All this was achieved while executing daily turnarounds and regular maintenance swiftly and correctly allowing the squadron to meet all Task Force objectives.

VP-46 shared much of the responsibility in the High North with their sister squadron, VP-9, much of the time flying on mixed crews or sharing aircraft to meet the mission requirements. Working alongside the Golden Eagles in a "one team, one fight" mind-set was one high point of the deployment and key to Task Force success.

This deployment had many firsts for the crews including detachments to Norway, Sweden, Israel and the first ever P-8A squadron to operate a detachment out of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

The VP-46 Grey Knights fly the P-8A Poseidon out of Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Washington and they are the oldest Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Squadron in the Fleet. From the Catalina to the P-2V Neptune to the P-3A Orion to the mighty P-8A Poseidon, the Grey Knights have participated in every major military conflict since its inception. The many successes of VP-46 are a direct result of the outstanding contributions made each and every day by the men and women who have the strength to fight and win and the honor to do it right. The Grey Knights of VP-46 continue to preserve their legacy by honoring the past, leading in the present, and forging the future. In this spirit, the Squadron retains its favored moniker, "THE OLDEST AND THE BEST."


reconnaissance information sharing.

Aircrew and maintainers from VP-10 were given the opportunity to mission plan and train with the RBAF while discussing the capabilities and roles of the P-8A Poseidon.

"I learned a lot on a cultural and strategic level from working with our RBAF counterparts," said Lt. j.g. Brandon Aro, a CAC-9 flight officer in the detachment. "We were able to share information and tactics about different mission scenarios which strengthen our interoperability and leads to improved and standardized evolutions in the future."


Over the course of eight days, the "Red Lancers" crew hosted several distinguished visitors including Commander Operations Group of the Royal Brunei Air Force Colonel Hishamuddin bin Abidin and participated in numerous combined-force events. The "Red Lancers" demonstrated how to preflight the P-8A Poseidon aircraft, exchanged information with other subject matter experts, and toured the Charleston with members of the RBAF.

CAC-9 wrapped up CARAT operations with a final tracking exercise aimed at increasing both navies' understanding of tracking and pursuing targets utilizing surface ships and aircraft.

The "Red Lancers" are based in Jacksonville, Florida and are currently operating from Kadena Air Base in Okinawa, Japan. The squadron conducts maritime patrol and reconnaissance, as well as theater outreach operations, as part of a rotational deployment to the U.S. 7th Fleet area of operations.






