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

Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Warriors Past and Present,

The MPRF's transformation from "Cold War" era legacy platforms to a technologically advanced, networked and more lethal Family of Systems (FoS) is a reality. Having just returned from a very well attended and successful Commander's Action Group (CAG), Naval Aviation Requirements Group (NARG) and MPRF Symposium in Jacksonville, it is clear that our community is at a crossroads. Leaning into the future and shifting to an all P-8A and Triton force is no longer theoretical.

This winter VP-30 graduated its last class of CAT 1 P-3C aviators with plans to stop all P-3 training and divest of its last Orion this June. With the MQ-4C Triton rapidly coming online, our remaining P-3C/EP-3 resources are focused on sustaining VQ-1 as it executes its sundown plan to final disestablishment. These closely choreographed events were set in motion over a decade ago with the decision to replace the P-3C with the P-8A Poseidon supported by TacMobile and the subsequent fielding of Triton to fall in behind the retiring EP-3 Aries. A proven spiral acquisition strategy accompanied by flawless execution of our transition has been recognized across the Navy



and Department of Defense as a model program and accurately reflected in our long range plan. More to the point, you can be proud of how far your community has advanced as we professionally and safely executed an unparalleled transformation of one of the most storied and strategically important communities in Naval Aviation.

This extraordinary transformation did not just happen. For those who attended this year's Heritage Dinner you heard me say, "We stand on the shoulders of giants." I truly believe that we would not be here today if it were not for the leadership, service and sacrifice of so many that have gone before. The list of MPRF notables is long and distinguished. In fact, it can be traced back to our very origin during the dawn of Naval Aviation. All one has to do is take a walk down our hallowed Hall of Honor located in the Integrated Training Center in Jacksonville to gain an appreciation for the courageous and accomplished shipmates that shaped our community over the last century. We added to that auspicious list this year by inducting CAPT Frankie Bryant and Admiral Bill Moran into our MPA Hall of Honor.

Both CAPT Bryant, who passed in 2017, and Admiral Moran are recognized as architects of today's MPRF. Commodore Bryant was instrumental in driving the community into new mission areas to effectively bridge the gap between the "Cold War" and the "Global War on Terror." Admiral Moran's philosophy while leading CPRG that, "If you can do ASW, you can do anything," became the mantra that allowed us to navigate the P-3C red-stripe of the early 2000's and set the stage to recapitalize the MPRF with a new, technologically advanced Family of Systems. We owe a great debt of gratitude to these, and so many more, titans of the MPRF. Yes, we do stand on the shoulders of Giants!

One of the most important lessons our leaders left us is the idea that our community performs best when we work as a team. The professional relationship that exists between the Fleet, NAVAIR Program Managers, and OPNAV

Requirements Officers (and a host of others) is unique in Naval Aviation and perhaps the Navy. Trust and credibility is the coin of the realm, and we have that in spades. The value of these symbiotic relationships and our mutual alignment cannot be overstated and I could not be more optimistic about our future.

I hope to continue the conversation in Whidbey Island the week of 25 September for our annual West Coast gathering. Until then, I wish you all the best as we continue to Fly, Fight, Lead and Win!

Chinese Jet Fighter Shadows U.S. Aircraft Over South China Sea

ABOARD A U.S. PATROL AIRCRAFT—A Chinese J-11 jet fighter, armed with four air-to-air missiles, appeared at the rear of an American P-8 patrol aircraft, passed above and settled a few hundred feet from the wing of the U.S. Navy plane.

"American aircraft, this is the PLA air force. You are approaching Chinese airspace. Keep a safe distance or you will be intercepted," a Chinese military ground station broadcast to the P-8, using the abbreviation for the People's Liberation Army.

Encounters such as the one on Friday over the South China Sea are now a near-daily occurrence, and they are becoming more dangerous, U.S. officials say.

In December, the U.S. accused a Chinese jet fighter of flying within 20 feet of a U.S. reconnaissance plane over the South China Sea. Beijing said the U.S. plane veered suddenly toward the jet. China hasn't responded to U.S. calls for talks about unsafe military encounters.

"The long-term trend is more and more aggression" by Chinese fighter pilots, said Capt. Will Toraason, the commander of U.S. Navy surveillance aircraft in the Western Pacific and Indian Ocean.

The U.S. shot down a suspected Chinese spy balloon after it passed over the U.S. earlier this month, raising tensions. China said it was a civilian meteorological balloon that blew off course.

Beijing has in turn accused the U.S. of spying on China, including by using patrol aircraft over the South China Sea. China claims almost all of the resource-rich maritime region, which is also an important trade route.

China has built military bases on artificial islands in the waters. That puts it into confrontation with other countries in the region that also have territorial claims and adds to U.S. concerns about trade routes and regional security.

Earlier this month, the Philippines said China's coast guard used a military-grade laser against a Philippine coast guard ship in the South China Sea.

U.S. patrol aircraft fly over the South China Sea on most days to push back on China's claims of control of the region, as well as to record images of the militarization of artificial islands. The Wall Street Journal flew on a P-8 patrol plane Friday as the crew used cameras, radar and other sensors to look at ships, aircraft and facilities on the islands.

The encounter between the P-8 and the Chinese jet fighter occurred a few dozen miles north of the Paracel Islands, claimed by both China and Vietnam. China has built military facilities on some of the islands

The P-8 responded to the Chinese warning by saying it was flying in international airspace. The Chinese ground station replied: "No approaching any more or you will pay full responsibility."

With the Chinese jet fighter still nearby, the U.S. Navy aircraft looped south around the islands and headed back across the South China Sea, passing over the Spratly Islands, another contested region. The Chinese jet pulled away after about an hour as the P-8 left the area of the Paracel Islands. No further jet fighters were seen.

China's foreign ministry didn't respond to questions about what territory it claims in the South China Sea or what it thinks about U.S. patrol flights.

After the December incident, a Chinese foreign ministry spokesman said: "The U.S. has frequently deployed aircraft and vessels for close-in reconnaissance on China, which poses a serious danger to China's national security. The U.S.'s provocative and dangerous moves are the root cause of maritime security issues."

"China will continue to take necessary measures to resolutely defend its sovereignty and security," the spokesman said.

The P-8 returned to its base in Okinawa, Japan, flying close to two Chinese naval destroyers, one north of the Philippines and another around 38 nautical miles off the eastern coast of Taiwan.

The aircraft is one of seven P-8 planes belonging to Patrol Squadron 10, which is based in Jacksonville, Fla., and currently on a six-month rotation in Japan.

Cmdr. Marc Hines, commanding officer of Patrol Squadron 10, said the missions contributed to upholding international norms, supporting U.S. partners and ensuring free commerce in international waters. He said China's challenges to the existing order had to be countered.

"If it's left unchecked, then what?" he said.


VP-10 also welcomes Cmdr. Scott Miller as the squadron's new executive officer.

Terry Tran, VP 30 pilot and instructor from Westminster, Calif."I have had the privilege to train and lead over 60 student pilots at VP-30. I have trained and led 25 classes of P-3C Pilots, ranging from Category One students, or first tour pilots to Category Five students, or prospective commanding and executive officers."

Although the Navy is moving away from the platform, numerous institutions will still use variations of the aircraft.

"The U.S. Customs and Border Protection Agency operates them to protect and enforce our borders," said Tran. "The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) uses heavily modified P-3s to hunt and monitor hurricanes. NASA also uses the P-3C platform as an airborne science laboratory, supporting scientific studies all over the globe."


