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


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Checking on Station

Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Warriors Past and Present,

We often measure our success with the achievement of a significant milestone. However, marking a single day on our calendar may not be the best way to capture the level of effort required to actually achieve that milestone. Such is the case with the inaugural deployment of the MQ-4C Triton Multi-INT Unmanned Aerial System (UAS). Earlier this month VUP-19, affectionately known as "Big Red," celebrated the deployment of two Triton air vehicles to Andersen Air force Base, Guam. While the on-time deployment of Triton Multi-INT certainly qualifies as achieving a milestone, it is in reality just the beginning of the next chapter in the transformation of the MPRF. More to the point, it marks the culmination of years of dedication and hard work by hundreds of people from the Persistent Maritime Unmanned Aircraft Systems Program Office (PMA-262), OPNAV Requirements Officers, CPRG staff, CPRW-11, VUP-19, and industry partners. Furthermore, without the foresight and support of Navy, DoD, and congressional leadership, Triton would have never gotten off the drawing board.



As a result of these efforts, we now stand on the precipice

of a new era in Naval Aviation as the Triton UAS brings persistent maritime and littoral Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR) data collection and dissemination capability to the Joint Force and Fleet Commander. Triton will immediately enhance situational awareness in the Indo-Pacific Area of Responsibility, and we are just getting started. Triton will be introduced to the 5th and 6th Fleet Area of Operations in due course as a result of the precise planning and professional execution of a team unique in Naval Aviation.

The fielding of this new and improved addition to the MPRF Family of Systems is the culmination of a vision created over ten years ago. Triton Multi-INT is the next step in our transformation of the MPRF and will serve as a force multiplier by freeing up our manned P-8A Poseidons to concentrate on missions for which it is best suited. Additionally, the ISR collection capabilities of Triton open the door for the planned retirement of our venerable EP-3 Aries aircraft.

The new MPRF Family of Systems - P-8A, Triton, and TacMobile - can trace its roots across a century of Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance operations, which have played a pivotal role in every hot or cold war and regional conflict that called for U.S. engagement. The ability of MPRF mission products to inform and influence key decision makers at the Fleet, Combatant Commander, and national level is legendary. Most of you reading this edition of Planeside have flown or supported MPR aircraft and played a critical role in protecting the interests of the United Sates and our allies. I join a grateful nation in extending my heartfelt appreciation for your service and establishing the culture of excellence that has become the hallmark of the MPRF. It is not lost on me - or leadership across our great Navy that without the superb performance of our aircrews on-station, supported by top-notch maintenance and support personnel on the ground, the community would not be where it is today. Bravo Zulu!

I look forward to thanking many of you in person in Whidbey Island the week of 18 September for our annual West Coast gathering. Until then, we will continue to Fly, Fight, Lead and Win!

Pro's Nest Sundown Ceremony Marks the End of an Era

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (June 23, 2023) Patrol Squadron (VP) 30 hosted a sundown ceremony for the P-3C Orion aircraft at VP-30 headquarters in Jacksonville, Fla., June 23.

Sailors, aviation leadership, local media, and distinguished guests were in attendance to commemorate the aircraft's 62 years of active service to the Fleet. The Orion had been the Navy's frontline, land-based maritime patrol aircraft since the early 1960s.

"After 60 years of maritime excellence, the watch has been relieved," said Senior Chief Naval Aircrewman Armando Carrillo, assigned to VP-30, who organized the event. "This plane has united six decades of Naval aviators, aircrew, maintenance, and support personnel. She has united people from different cultures, backgrounds and generations. She is one of the few platforms in the Navy with this kind of history."

While the ceremony was a celebration, those in attendance felt a certain duality as the last P-3C Orion left the hangar.

"This is all very bitter sweet," said Lt. Cmdr. (Ret.) Donald Cooper, a distinguished guest and a former Naval Aircrewman. "My dad and I both served aboard P-3 aircraft. It is the end of an era."

"Bitter sweet is absolutely how I would describe it," said Naval Aircrewman 2nd Class (Ret.) Pat Augustine, a distinguished guest. "My entire Navy career happened in a P-3 aircraft and she always brought us home. I will be sad to never hear that 68 hertz tone from the engine again or see them fly over my house."

Although her service to the Fleet is slated to come to an end, the impact this plane has had on the Navy will live on forever.

"We have a rich, glorious heritage to look back upon," said Capt. Derrick Eastman, commanding officer, VP-30. "For 62 years, this plane and the aircrews that quicken her have stood the watch overseas and off our own coasts."

The P-3 would not have had such an extended time of service without versatility.

"When you think of the different platforms used in the Navy, there aren't too many that make it past the half century barrier," said Capt. Dennis Jensen, a Navy pilot and the prospective Commodore of Task Force 57 homeported in Manama, Bahrain. "The P-3 is one of five aircraft in the history of Naval aviation to break that barrier. As the mission changed and as the focus changed and the Nation called us to do something else, we did not stay stuck in the past, we adapted the aircraft. It is because of that adaptability and flexibility this platform has stood the test of time."

The P-3 aircraft was first introduced to the Fleet on April 15, 1961 aboard VP-8 and VP-44.

Scientific Development Squadron (VXS) 1, and Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron (VQ) 1 are the only commands that will continue to utilize a modified version of the P-3 aircraft. VQ-1 is slated to sundown the EP-3E Aries in 2025.

Patrol Squadron Two Six Hosts JMSDF Commander in Chief

In addition to showcasing the P-8A, the Tridents enjoyed camaraderie with the JMSDF by trading patches and comparing their military cultures. Upon departing the aircraft, SAITO shook hands with the Trident crew and offered each member a challenge coin to commemorate the flight.

"It is always a pleasure hosting our counterparts from allied and partner nations," Toraason said. "This opportunity was a great way to showcase the U.S. Navy and JMSDF alliance and interoperability."

The VP-26 Tridents are based in Jacksonville, Florida, and are currently forward-deployed to Misawa Air Base in Misawa, Japan. The squadron conducts maritime patrol and reconnaissance, as part of a rotational deployment to the U.S. 7th Fleet area of operations.

Take care of your families and take care of each other."

Capt. Troy Tartaglia, Commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing (CPRW) 11 received the traditional salutes as command of the squadron was passed to Cmdr. James Reeves.

After assuming command, Cmdr. Reeves addressed the "Fighting Tigers" for the first time as their commanding officer.

Reeves is VP-8's 75th commanding officer. He is a native of Orient, New York and a 2006 graduate of the State University of New York Maritime College, where he earned a Bachelor of Engineering in Maritime Electrical Engineering. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science in Global Leadership from Duquesne University. He was designated a naval aviator in 2007. Reeves will lead VP-8 through the remainder of the squadron's home cycle and through their upcoming scheduled deployment.

The Fighting Tigers also welcomed Cmdr. A.J. Dierks as the new executive officer.

VP-8 was commissioned as VP-201 in September 1942 in Norfolk, Virginia. During World War II, flying the sea-based PBM Mariner aircraft. In June 1947, the squadron transitioned to the land-based P-2V Neptune aircraft. The squadron was renamed to VP-8 in September 1948, and in October 1962, VP-8 became the first operational P-3 Orion squadron in the U.S. Navy. Following the squadron's 37th P-3 Orion deployment, VP-8 transitioned to the P-8A Poseidon in 2015. 





Congratulations to CDR St. Aubin and a massive thank you to CDR Reid for his leadership and dedication to the squadron! Fair Winds and Following Seas!






