

Checking on Station

Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Warriors Past and Present,

Greetings from Norfolk! In way of introduction, I am Brett Mietus, the new Commander of Patrol and Reconnaissance Group (CPRG). I had the distinct honor to relieve RDML Adam "Kujo" Kijek, a great American who superbly led the MPRF for the last two years. Willow and I could not be more excited to be back in the community where it all began for us. To serve every day alongside the dedicated men and women of our great community during such a transformational period in our storied history...it really is the honor of a lifetime.

That said, it has been a while since I was the Commander of Wing Ten... and as a result, I wanted to come-in, listen, and learn prior to putting together my Commander's intent and vision. My initial impressions are not surprising. Outside of high-end SPEC OPS, there is no community within our Navy or our Department of Defense that performs at such a consistently high level – and is so widely trusted. Quite simply, we are the best at what we do, from finding and holding at risk adversary submarines and surface combatants to conducting high-end Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance.

While it is important to take pride in our success, it is also important that we are transparent and honest in identifying and facing our challenges. Upon initial observation, I see three challenges facing our community and our Navy today.



- The first is a global environment that creates a risk that is unique in our nation's history. Our pacing threat remains the Peoples Republic of China, which is actively developing the military capability to invade Taiwan. We must plan. Plan like we will be tasked to counter this aggression, and MPRF must be ready on day one to operate from multiple bases and attrite enemy ships and submarines... coordinating lethal and non-lethal effects in the battlespace to enable Fleet maneuver and decisive action.
- My second observation is that the ongoing transformation of our family of systems, towards a new community steady-state, is more challenging than the transition was from P-3 to P-8.
- The third challenge is that our community's operational pace (our VP home-cycle and VUP stand-up) creates risk to our collective safety and wellness, and the retention of our best and brightest.

So, how do we tackle these challenges? We do it together, through focused collaboration and problem solving. Over the past three years, Navy has released two complementary, and self-reinforcing initiatives, with a common focus on unleashing the power of our people.

- The first of these initiatives is Get Real, Get Better (GRGB), which challenges leaders to solve hard problems by demonstrating specific leadership behaviors and problem-solving methods, applying a self-assessing, self-correcting, and always learning mindset.
- The second initiative is Culture of Excellence 2.0, which builds on GRGB and provides standards for how Navy will produce a superior warfighting culture in every command, the result of the interaction between its People, its Leaders, and its Teams.

Every step MPRF takes will be based-in and enabled-by these two initiatives. At every step, we will look to organize existing efforts towards better outcomes, making things easier and better over time. Our Priorities and Vision are all within the context of CNO's Warfighting, Warfighters, and the Foundation that supports them, and our Air Boss' follow-on guidance. Boiled down, all this serves to underpin our community's overarching Mission and Purpose.

Mission - Preparing our Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Force for Combat

Purpose - Work together with the Joint Force, allies, and partners to find things beneath or on the sea and destroy them.

And above all, as a Force, we are and will remain: Trusted, Ready, and Lethal. NAS Sigonella Welcomes First MQ-4C Triton

NAVAL AIR STATION SIGONELLA, Italy (March 30, 2024) – The first MQ-4C Triton arrived to Naval Air Station (NAS) Sigonella, March 30, 2024.

The MQ-4C's arrival to the U.S. Sixth Fleet area of operations marks the second forward-deployed detachment for VUP-19. A total of three detachments are planned when the program is fully operational. Deployments like this enhance U.S. Navy interoperability with NATO Allies and partners.

"The addition of the MQ-4C Triton, right here in Sigonella, is another milestone in the successful development of the Triton program," said Capt. Aaron Shoemaker, Commanding Officer, NAS Sigonella. "We are proud to support VUP-19 [Unmanned Patrol Squadron (VUP) 19] as they integrate with the Fleet to expand the roles of unmanned aircraft systems operations in our region and beyond."

The MQ-4C Triton is the Navy's newest Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Maritime Patrol asset and augments the capabilities of the P-8 Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft.

To prepare for the arrival of the Triton in Italy, VUP-19 "Big Red" held a ceremony to celebrate the deployment and the opening of a new Triton hangar at NAS Sigonella, March 2.

VUP-19, homeported in Florida at Naval Air Station Jacksonville and Naval Station Mayport, boasts more than 300 Sailors and officers from various aviation ratings and officer communities who maintain and operate the Triton around the world. Aircrew gather and process surveillance information utilizing data fusion tools that integrate sensor data from multiple aircraft into a comprehensive networked picture to further assist in building an accurate threat representation.

VUP-19 achieved initial operation capability in September 2023 during its deployment to Andersen Air Force Base, Guam.

Naval Air Station Sigonella provides consolidated operational, command and control, administrative, logistical and advanced logistical support to U.S. and other NATO forces. The installation's strategic location enables U.S., allied, and partner nation forces to deploy and respond as required, ensuring security and stability in Europe, Africa and Central Command.

VP-4 Wows Crowd at 2024 Pacific Airshow Gold Coast

The United States Navy's P-8A Poseidon is ready to showcase its formidable capabilities and cutting-edge technology to Australian audiences next month.

"We are absolutely thrilled for the opportunity to demonstrate the P-8A Poseidon at this year's Pacific Airshow Gold Coast," said Lieutenant Simon Lyon, from his homebase in Misawa, Japan, where he works for Commander, Task Force (CTF) 72.

The P-8A Poseidon, known for its versatility and advanced systems, will be performing a series of manoeuvres designed to highlight its prowess in various mission sets.

"We're hoping to demonstrate the P-8A doing low-altitude flight while dropping an acoustic sonobuoy," Lyon said.

Naval Aircrewman Operator Petty Officer First Class (AWO1) Quintana, an Electronic Warfare Operator from the detachment crew, is heading 'down under' and looks forward to sharing more about his experiences as a P-8A operator.

"Okinawa is a refreshing experience, the people are very kind," he said. "The island is clean, and the stores are organised with care, the restaurants all prepare food with pride and a sense of passion from what I've experienced. The military experience is very dynamic compared to being home in the United States. At home, it's a little more structured in terms of my own transportation, apartment and getting to and from the hangar and flights. Here we rely on a bus schedule, pack light and meal prep so that we are able to constantly be on the go for flights and operations!"

The P-8A Poseidon serves multiple critical roles, including anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface warfare, intelligence surveillance and reconnaissance and maritime domain awareness. It can also support humanitarian assistance, disaster relief and counter-narcotic operations. The P-8A has a range of about 1200 nautical miles and a speed of 490 knots, with a ceiling of 41,000 feet. It features an advanced multi-role radar, electro-optical/infrared camera and a robust communications suite of long-range and line-of-sight radios. It can be armed with torpedoes, Harpoon anti-surface missiles and acoustic sonobuoys used for anti-submarine warfare.

The collaboration between US Navy P-8A units and the Royal Australian Air Force P-8A Poseidon units has been a highlight of numerous joint exercises.

"US Navy P-8As have routinely operated alongside RAAF P-8A Poseidon units in exercises such as Kakadu, Talisman Sabre, Malabar, RIMPAC and Sea Dragon, which is hosted by CTF-72 in Guam. We are always excited to operate alongside RAAF P-8A units whenever we get the opportunity," said LT Lyon.

A typical P-8A crew comprises three Pilots, two Naval Flight Officers, two Electronic Warfare Operators and two Acoustic Operators, all working seamlessly to ensure mission success. Reflecting on his time with the P-8A Poseidon, AWO1 Quintana said his most memorable experiences from flying in the P-8A was being able to see the world at different heights.

"I've been to Japan, Palau, Guam, Thailand, Philippines, Sicily, Iceland, Scotland and England. The most clear memory I have over the years aside from the people on my various crews? Hands down - being able to witness sunrises, sunsets, constellations, mountain ranges, storms over the horizon, lightning, rain, calm seas or the northern lights," he said. It always seems to make me feel small and grateful for the job we're able to do up there."

VP-10 Changes Command

NAVAL AIR FACILITY MISAWA, Japan. — Cmdr. Scott Miller relieved Cmdr. Luke Huston, becoming the 88th commanding officer of the "Red Lancers" of Patrol Squadron (VP) 10 during a change of command ceremony while forward deployed at Naval Air Facility Misawa Japan, June 4.

VP-10, which operates the P-8A Poseidon aircraft, is one of the original naval aviation squadrons and one of the oldest patrol squadrons in the Navy. It traces its official heritage to 1930 with the commissioning of Patrol Bombing Squadron 10S, and was instrumental during the Battle of Midway.

This ceremony marked the conclusion of a successful tour for Cmdr. Huston. Over the course of his career, he accumulated over 2,800 flight hours in the P-3C Orion and P-8A Poseidon aircraft. In April, he led the squadron on deployment to the Fifth and Seventh Fleet areas of responsibility. While deployed as Task Group 72.4, Cmdr. Huston led the largest Commander, Task group in the Seventh Fleet area of responsibility composed of over 400 personnel and 12 aircraft. As Commander, Task Group 57.18, his team immediately began supporting U.S. Naval Forces Central Command on the execution of PROSPERITY GUARDIAN.

Cmdr. Huston's personal awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, four Strike/Flight Air Medals, four Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals, three Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals, and various campaign, unit, and service awards. The "Red Lancers" take pride in wishing Cmdr. Huston fair winds and following seas as he retires from the United States Navy.

Cmdr. Miller joined VP-10 as the executive officer in May 2023. His other operational tours include VP-8 where he was nominated as Commander, Naval Air Forces Atlantic Naval Flight Officer of the Year, USS George H. W. Bush (CVN 77) as assistant navigator, later returning to VP-8 as the operations officer (OPSO), and Commander, Task Group 72.4 OPSO. Cmdr. Miller's shore tours consisted of VP-30, Joint Chiefs of Staff in Washington, D.C. as a Strategic Planner, and the Maritime Patrol and Reconnaissance Weapons School (MPRWS).

His personal awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, two Strike/ Flight Air Medals, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, four Navy Commendation Medals, four Navy Achievement Medals, and various campaign, unit, and service awards.

VP-10 also welcomes Cmdr. Daniel Russell as the squadron's new executive officer.

The VP-10 "Red Lancers" are based in Jacksonville, Fla., and are currently deployed to the U.S. Fifth and Seventh Fleet areas of responsibility conducting maritime patrol and reconnaissance operations in support of U.S. Indo-Pacific and U.S. Central Command objectives throughout the regions.

Unmanned Patrol Squadron 19 Heads to Recruit Training Command

GREAT LAKES, ILLINOIS (April 3, 2024) – Teaming up with Recruit Training Command (RTC) in Great Lakes, Illinois, Unmanned Patrol Squadron (VUP) 19 "Big Red" officially sponsored its first division of Navy recruits, April 3. Integrated Division 145 consists of 88 men and women from all corners of the United States eager to make the transition from civilian life into active duty naval service. Reinforcing the Navy core values and dedication to duty, VUP-19 Sailors are mentoring, motivating, educating the recruits, working to set and accomplish goals, and build mental, physical and emotional resiliency.

As the official sponsor, VUP-19 is assisting in encouraging success throughout the 10-week journey where recruits will see if they have what it takes to become a Sailor. Along this journey, members of the squadron are traveling to RTC to talk to the recruits about how the lessons learned in boot camp directly contribute to success in the fleet. Lead Recruit Division Commander (RDC) and Chief Retail Service Specialist Corderra Lee is in charge of the division at Great Lakes. This is his fourth division as an RDC and when asked why he decided to take on one of the Navy's most arduous duties he replied, "What better place to lead than the quarterdeck of the Navy?"

Division 145's other leader is RDC Boatswain's Mate 2nd Class Lindsey Liles who is also on his fourth division. "When I look back on the impact I had in my career, I will know my time as a recruit division commander made a difference," he said.

Personnel Specialist 2nd Class Jamesha Thompson is another leader of the division. This is her first time leading recruits. "I also wanted to train the next generation of Sailors and impact them in their new career. And, I wanted to gain more leadership skills."

As the Navy's first and only unmanned patrol squadron, squadron personnel understand the meaning of hard work. The continuous evolution and growth the MQ-4C platform requires Sailors to keep their skills sharp and attention to detail even sharper. Attending the division's official commissioning ceremony, the Big Red team provided the squadron's history, aircraft capabilities, and current events. They elaborated on how hard work only begins at RTC but transitions to ultimate commands.

As VUP-19 heads out on deployment this summer, they are working tirelessly in preparation for their upcoming missions.

"Our United States Navy is forged by men, women, sons, daughters, fathers and mothers that do extraordinary things," said VUP-19 Commanding Officer Cmdr. Stephen Williams. "Every Sailor no matter the paygrade must have a replacement in order to advance. It is a beautiful thing that VUP-19 has the privilege and honor of going to the forge of those amazing replacements of excellence - Navy RTC. New recruits we are ready for you to join us and take the baton when the time comes!"

"I think sponsoring a division at RTC is a big deal for the Navy, RTC and for VUP-19," added VUP-19 Command Master Chief Timothy Hardin. "This gives my Sailors here the opportunity to mentor and share Navy experiences with new recruits. Our Sailors can give them the ins and outs of the fleet before they get to their first command. It basically comes down to us paying it forward and making our replacements better informed than we were at that point in boot camp."





VP-8 Fighting Tigers Host Change of Command Ceremony

JACKSONVILLE, FL- Cdr. A.J. Dierks relieved Cdr. James Reeves as the commanding officer of squadron VP-8 fighting tigers during a change of command ceremony, May 31. Reeves served as the commanding officer during VP-8's first deployment as an AAS squadron, while deployed to Kadena, Japan they flew over 4,100 hours in ASW, ISR, ASUW, and search and rescue missions.

"My time with VP-8 has been Incredible! I am so proud of the women and men of this squadron. This is a selfless group of professionals focused on building a winning culture that makes our team, our sister squadrons, and our force better every day. "

Reeves has been a member of the fighting tigers for two years serving as the executive officer from 2022-2023 prior to taking over as commanding officer. CDR Reeves is a native of Orient, NY, and a 2006 graduate of the State University of New York Maritime College, where he earned a Bachelor of Engineering in Marine Electrical Engineering. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science in Global Leadership from Duquesne University. He was designated a naval aviator in 2007 and completed fleet replacement training with Patrol Reconnaissance Squadron (VP) 30 in 2008.

Reeves said upon taking over as the Commanding Officer of VP-8 some of his goals were, "Building connected teams through Sailor and family resiliency. Our Tiger Thrive initiative was built to infuse fulfillment and meaning opportunities into every organizational task and commitment. Literally bake nurturing the mind, body, and spirit into our plan just like we plan for tactical excellence or precision maintenance. I'm proud of our progress and excited to see where the Tiger team takes the process moving forward into year three."

Dierks takes over as the 76th Commanding Officer in the squadron's history. CDR AJ Dierks is a native of Hot Springs, Arkansas, and a 2007 graduate of the United States Naval Academy, where he received a Bachelor of Science in Information Technology. CDR Dierks has served as Naval Flight Officer Training Officer for the P-3C Fleet Replacement Squadron, Patrol Squadron THIRTY, as the MPRA Sea Detailer at PERS-43 in Millington, Tennessee, and as a Congressional Liaison for the Navy to the House and Senate Appropriations Committees as part of the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Financial Management and Comptroller. He has served at sea as part of Patrol Squadron SIXTEEN, Patrol Squadron ONE, and aboard USS CARL VINSON (CVN-70).

"I could not be more honored to take command of VP-8. The culture we have created together over the past year, and that has been in work since before my time, is what bonds our team together and will continue to propel this unit to new heights. Our focus will be to continue to infuse relevant and impactful mind, body, and spirit training into our plan, improve safety and sailor care at work, and aggressively pursue tactical excellence in all mission areas. I am excited for this next year and seeing all of the great accomplishments our team will achieve!"

Dierks has served as the Executive Officer for VP-8 for the past year and has the complete support of CDR Reeves. "As his final words to the VP-8 Fighting Tigers, Reeves stated "Thank you to the Sailors and families that make up our Fighting
